

Literacy

- Write your own story about a child who goes on a steam-train.
- Ask an older member of your family to write a story with lots of mistakes and then you can edit it by adding capital letters and full stops.
- Help an adult make a snack and then write the instructions on how you did it.

Art

- Why not try to make your own model vehicle at home? You could make a car out of cardboard boxes.
- Try drawing a design of a space ship.
- Paint a picture of an imaginary mode of transport. Can it fly? Can it sail?

Science

- Draw a picture of a train and label the materials it is made out of.
- How many types of materials can you collect from around the house?
- Find three different materials that you can test with an adult. Is it waterproof? Is it bendy? Can you see through it?

How has transport changed over time?

Maths

- Look at the clock at home, let someone know when it is o'clock or half-past.
- Write an addition and subtraction equation at home. Can you complete it before an adult does?
- Create your own fact families using number bonds to 20.
- You create your own addition story for someone at home.
- Can you give someone directions using positional language i.e. clockwise, anti-clockwise, forwards and backwards?



Reading

- Try reading with fluency and expression.
- Why not recreate the story you are reading through drama.

Topic

- Go for a walk and make a tally of all the different modes of transport you can see.
- Draw a picture of the first trains and buses. Put this in your learning folder.
- Choose a transport from the past and research some facts about it.
Eg. What year was the first one made? What materials was it made from?
